- Enhanced our diversity, equity, and inclusion (DEI) efforts by creating Together We Can™, a new program soft launched in late 2020 to educate, enable, and empower a lifestyle of mindfulness and action against racism

Our "Together We" programs touched a record number of lives in North Texas and beyond last year. We are off to another great start in 2021. Upon reflecting on our business accomplishments presented on the following pages, it has never been more evident that it takes a village to create change. We could not have made such meaningful inroads in our community without the leadership of our Board of Directors and the commitment of our individual and corporate supporters, volunteers, and of course, our dedicated Project Unity team. Project Unity Mission Statement

Project Unity is a nonprofit organization focused on building and sustaining community throughout Dallas and North Texas.
Founded by Pastor Richie Butler of St. Luke "Community" United Methodist Church, our mission is to bring together the community to find common ground and healing through dialogue, events, activities, and educational opportunities, all to improve race relations in our city.

Our Community Impact — Programs

Pivoting in a Pandemic

The Dallas community was hit hard by COVID-19, and the importance of our virus testing in underserved communities across the Metroplex became clear. Some of our traditional, in-person programs had to be put on hold, but this opened up new opportunities for our staff, volunteers, and partners to unite the city through new initiatives, like Together We Test.

Together We Test

In early 2020, the initial stages of the COVID-19 pandemic, Project Unity recognized the tremendous threat the virus posed to the Dallas community. We quickly launched Together We Test to provide free COVID-19 testing in communities of color, which were underserved and disproportionately impacted by the virus.

Together We Test contributed to creating safer communities by alerting individuals of positive



test results, thus helping to contain further spread of the virus. The program also created jobs for individuals who found themselves furloughed and unemployed due to the pandemic. The initiative created new relationships among nonprofits, medical and health professions, and the faith community that will contribute to medical and health service programs in the future.

We organized drive-thru testing sites with five churches across the DFW Metroplex. We received extensive media attention from outlets like WFAA, NBC 5, CBS 11, and NPR. The program helped bring greater awareness to the systemically lacking response to critical health threats in underserved communities. We would not have been able to operate Together We Test without the generous contributions from our donors.

Together We Can™

Following the murder of George Floyd in 2020, attorney Robert Crain of Crain Lewis Brogdon, L.L.P. and Project Unity's founder Pastor Richie Butler created Together We Can as a part of our diversity, equity and inclusion solution to help reshape America's journey with racism and provide individuals, businesses, and groups of all kinds the tools to educate, enable, and empower a lifestyle of mindfulness and action against racism. Together We Can is successful by building trust and fostering authentic relationships with the diverse residents of Dallas and people across the country.

Soft-launched in 2020, TWC is a positive, non-judgmental, non-political program that addresses personal and community development by making changes inside and out. The program's first

component includes participants attending and/or hosting at least one Together We Dine event. In November 2020, an online cultural learning component was added to the program that asked participants to devote at least one hour each month to self-educate on other ethnic groups.

In spring 2021, we added a retail component – the sale of Together We Can wristbands. The goal of the wristbands is to show support for improving race relations and to spark conversations around unity. We initiated a public marketing campaign and released wristbands to 29 Tom Thumb stores in 2021 with plans to expand to additional retail ventures over time. We anticipate a national, if not worldwide reach in the future through Together We Can.

Together We Dine™

Since 2017, Together We Dine has brought thousands of people together to engage in healthy and structured dialogue about race relations. After a pause due to the pandemic, we converted in-person conversations to having those discussions over a virtual table. Volunteers contributed over 600 hours so that nearly 1,400 individuals in the Dallas community and beyond could experience discussions and share their beliefs and differences about race over lunch or dinner.

Feedback from program participants continue to prove that what unites us is greater than what divides us. Despite an abbreviated schedule, the program reached record participation, in no small part due to the extraordinary 2020 partnerships with the organizations listed below. Events come at no cost to attendees due to the vital support from our sponsors.

Together We Learn™

For several years, Project Unity has partnered with the National Black Police Association to offer teens practical instruction on how to act and react during traffic or pedestrian stops by police. Students participate in mock traffic stop scenarios and in an open dialogue with officers. Due to Covid-19, we paused programming for a significant portion of the year as school districts and youth organizations wrestled with the educational, safety and other challenges they faced with and for their students. During that time, we expanded our programming to include a virtual option which was successfully piloted later in the year.

Together We Learn is successful because of our partnerships with the National Black Police Association, Dallas Police Department, Dallas ISD Office of Racial Equity, Dallas ISD Police, University of North Texas at Dallas, Sewell Lexus Dallas and Eric McHenrey, and Senator Royce West.

In 2021, we plan to begin work on an artificial intelligence/virtual reality solution designed to enhance and advance the learning experience of Together We Learn.




Financials

(Dollar figures in thousands)



In addition, police officers contributed hours of valuable time developing content for our Together We Learn program. Project Unity has been growing by leaps and bounds. We've moved from a completely volunteer-based organization to a combination of employees, contract staff, and volunteers in a year's time.

As our programs expand in number, content, and reach, we see opportunities to exert a national influence in addition to our local impact. This development is consistent with our strategic vision of growth and self-sufficiency in terms of operations and financial stability.

In 2020, Project Unity's workforce grew substantially reaching a height of 11 staff members, a giant leap from a team of only dedicated volunteers the previous year. Our team of full- and part-time staff is comprised of both direct employees and contract staff.

The Project Unity team, along with dozens of incredible volunteers, worked through the pandemic to deliver four impactful signature programs with excellence. We could not have accomplished the amazing work of 2020 without our team of employees, contractors, and volunteers. Thanks to each of you!
